## Key issues

- mutual history of „Visegrad“ countries
- K. u. K (Imperial and Royal) Army x Legionary Army
- huge amount of various types of documents stored in libraries:
  - e. g. newspapers, lists of killed soldiers, photographs, diaries, maps
- general public wants it...:
  - e. g. „My grandfather was killed somewhere by Somme...“
- various institutions should be involved in these digitization activities
  - Military Institutes, Archives, Museums, Personal Archives, etc.
- delimitation to other projects targeted to „Great War“



# What is in our collections...

## Personal Data

- lists of killed soldiers issued by the Austrian Ministry of War
  - Verlustliste ausgegeben am...
  - Schematismus für des Kaiserliche und Königliche Heer und die Kaiserliche Kriegs-Marine (1870-1914) etc.
  - Ranglisten der K. K. Landwehr und der K. K. Gendarmerie 1916-1918
  - Verordnungsblatt für das k. u. k. Heer : Personalangelegenheiten 1914-1919
  - Verordnungsblatt für die k. k. Landwehr : Personalangelegenheiten 1914-1919.

## Legionnaire Literature

- monographs, periodicals, regimental chronicles
  - Táborita (1917)
  - Československý legionář (1919-1938)
  - Hlídka zajatců (1917)
  - Regimental Chronicles collection
  - Heimat (1919-1920)



# What is in our collections...

## Official Historical Resources

- great possibility to follow the journey of the specific regiments of the Austro-Hungarian Army troops
  - Österreich-Ungarns letzter Krieg
  - Österreich-Ungarns Seekrieg 1914-18
  - Troop Chronicles:
    - Za svobodu! (Legionary in Russia)
    - V boj! (Legionary in Italy)



# What is in our collections...

## Memoirs and Autobiographies

- rich memoir literature archive, both from the Czechoslovak's Legionnaires and soldiers of the Austro-Hungarian Armed Forces

## Contemporary visual publications

- their contribution would be grounded primarily as the visual resource, which is used frequently for publication outputs or as open evidence of war propaganda
